

Improving the Safety and Well-Being of Nursing Staff in Psychiatric Settings

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
Background

- Nurses in psychiatric settings face a significantly higher risk of workplace violence, with assault rates reaching 50-70% during their careers.
- These incidents compromise nurse well-being, patient care, and healthcare system stability

Purpose

Hypothetical quality improvement (QI) project aimed to reduce assaults on nursing staff in psychiatric inpatient units.

Identifying Root Causes of Assault on Nursing Staff



Methods

- A multi-faceted approach including:
- De-escalation training
 - Environmental modifications
 - Enhanced incident reporting systems
 - Peer support networks

Implications

- Safety interventions can significantly reduce workplace violence in psychiatric settings
- Potential for widespread improvement across psychiatric units nationally due to standardization of de-escalation training
