Financial Burden Experiences of Black/African American Breast Cancer Survivors: A Meta-Ethnography

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## **Introduction**


- Racial minorities, especially Black/AA women, face higher financial toxicity during breast cancer treatment.
- This persists even after accounting for socioeconomic differences.
- This review aimed to explore and provide meaningful interpretations of the financial experiences of Black/AA BC survivors (BCS).

## Methods

- Conducted a systematic search of qualitative studies (2009-2024) on financial experiences of Black/AA BCS during treatment.
- Used the Meta-Ethnography Reporting Guidance (eMERGe) to follow Noblit and Hare's seven phases of meta-ethnography.
- Quality of studies assessed using the Joanna Briggs Institute critical appraisal tool.

## **A**nalysis

Seven studies with 169 participants (136 Black women), ages 28-80 years.
